So, many thanks to him, and I very much hope that you will enjoy its contents.

We also welcome the formation of the Friends of Chelmsford Hockey Club Re-united, which aims to revive contact with many members and ex-members who otherwise may not be aware of what's going on in the club. We hope that having our news in this format will encourage you to drop into the clubhouse when you're in the Galleywood area. A traditional, warm Chelmsford welcome is guaranteed!

As you will see further inside The Chelmer, we have had an "interesting" season, particularly for our high profile flagship sides: the Men's and Ladies' 1st XIs who enjoyed seasons of mixed fortunes. The men had a nail biting finish to the season, but survived in the East Conference and also became the inaugural winners of the national Indoor Trophy competition. The Ladies, despite a much improved second half of the season were relegated to the East Conference. Both sides are very young and I was very proud of the way, despite many narrow defeats, they remained determined and gritty right to the last game – well supported to the end by their managers and coaches. They played with true Chelmsford spirit and I'm sure will do well next year.

But they are just two sides, and we continue (with some hard work from the Chairs of Selection!) to field in total 8 men and 5 ladies sides which achieved mixed results, but again played with spirit and enthusiasm. I hope that all players have said a big "thanks" to their captains, who have worked tirelessly and burnt out the phone lines to get sides out and ensure that everyone enjoys their hockey. Truly 13 unsung heroes!!

Over and above this we have a large and very active junior section with around 150 members supported by fantastic coaches and parents; indoor sides; a mixed XI, take part in tournaments, cup-runs and host many events at our splendid hockey centre including most recently the British Universities hockey

semi-finals with whom Ken Lochhead was associated for so many years. We have also been selected as one of the training centres for London 2012 – so you can see the pace at Chelmer Park never slows!!

We're very fortunate that over the years we have had many dedicated workers for the club on and off the field. Ursula Heelis stepped down as President at the end of last season. Ursula led a team which secured £1.2m of lottery funding for the water pitch and new changing rooms. This was finally commemorated by a smart plaque hanging just inside the changing room entrance lobby – "Better late than never!" I can hear Ros Marsh saying!!

We also lost a number of players who retired or left and I hope you won't mind me picking our some very significant departees from the ladies 1sts: Tracey Wilmore and Lynn Bollington, "Bolly", who we thought would play until she was nearly 100, decided to retire early having given 25 years of her playing life to the club. There is more on Bolly's hockey career elsewhere in "The Chelmer". And also our Beijing Olympians Lisa Wooding, Katy Roberts and Chloe Rogers (so you can see why our 1st XI girls were up against it this season !!). And now, Lisa Baillie – "Poodle" is retiring from being manager of the ladies at the end of this season. I know they will continue to give support to the club – as was noted at a recent presentation event, "Chelmsford players' blood runs green"!!

Just as we note players moving on to new pastures and challenges, you will also want to read the "Remembering" section for some old Chelmsford friends that have passed away this season.

No hockey club can survive these days without the enthusiasm of its members and financial support over and above subscriptions and match fees. Chelmsford's aim is to get our 1st XIs back into the premier divisions of the national league; and to ensure that we are well equipped to bring children into our wonderful sport and help them play at the highest level their abilities allow. We can't do that without generous support from sponsors and I would like to thank particularly our principal sponsor for the last two seasons - Capital Spreads; the many advertisers in our match programme and Alliance Sports who have taken over our kit supply.

Two Australians , Jamie Bahnish and Geoff Mills joined Chelmsford in late January to strengthen the Men's 1sts and try to help stop the firsts dropping out of the English Hockey East Conference League. Chelmsford sponsored them to play here with the 1sts in February and March. Geoff was a forward and Jamie a sweeper.

Both play for Forestville in the South Australia league (see their web-site on www.fhc.com.au – they have a catchy club song which Hunts has promised the firsts will sing at the Men's dinner). Both have represented South Australia at under 21 and other levels, although, perhaps a bit modestly, neither think they will break into full representation in the Australia squad which is overwhelmingly based in the National Academy in Perth, Western Australia.

Forestville as a club - "proudly the oldest hockey club in Australia" - is one of 8

or 10 bigger clubs in South Australia and in fact the structure of the club is very similar to Chelmsford's with 6 men, 4 ladies plus Vets and Juniors although Forestville, at only 104 years old is a mere youngster compared to Chelmsford which is now 111 years old. However I don't suppose Chelmsford can boast having had a one armed captain, which Forestville had in 1908 (see the photo on their web-site) – I guess he was nick-named the Fugitive. Forestville are known as the Panthers.

Both Geoff and Jamie are studying in the sports industry, Geoff as a teacher in 3rd – 9th grade and Jamie hopes to coach either hockey or Aussie Rules Football.

As well as playing with us, they took the opportunity to travel round Europe – Rome, Barcelona and so on and seem to have used opportunities to join in socially with the club. They stayed with David Hunter whilst here.

They have found the rules interpreted less tightly here, particularly on the strength into tackles which get a warning here but would get a yellow card in Australia – bit surprising really as we tend to think of Australians as a bit hard (watch a bit of Aussie Rules Football if you don't agree). Fitness levels and technical skills are similar.

Anyway they thoroughly enjoyed their stay with us and are grateful for the chance to help. We are glad to have had them with us as it has broadened our (and probably their) outlook and probably helped the firsts to stay in the league.

The Super 2s newsletter's "Column Inches" also interviewed the Aussies.....

Jamie: OK, it's a bit of a culture shock. We can't barter with sheep anymore, we have to use "money".


Cl: Wow, bet you miss all those sheep, hey?

Mens 1s Review 2008/9 - "Seve" - Ian Belchamber

We win the Essex Indoor Cup and the National Indoor Trophy and stay in the National League (just).

2008-09 will not go down as one of Chelmsford 1st XI's finest, but in the end, the side did just enough to ensure National League hockey next season.

The side, not for the first time, enjoyed a very promising pre-season, with wins against Sevenoaks, Bath, Canterbury and Bourneville, but once the league season started the side only obtained one draw from the first six games. This was not helped by having no coach for until November, due to Duncan Woods' decision not to continue in the role.

Pete Mepham however, stepped into the role alongside his trusty sidekick, Sandra Seleska as the side's Manager and one of the first objectives was to improve the discipline, and this was extremely successful, going seven games without a yellow card (which considering the double digit yellow cards, plus

one red was a remarkable achievement!).

At Christmas we were rock bottom, with just three draws. All of these draws were grabbed from the jaws of victory, as we imploded on more than one occasion to concede important late goals. In fact, I think if games were 68 minutes long we probably would have doubled our points tally over the course of the whole season.

Over Christmas we had a re-think about the side and we looked overseas for help and we were very lucky to obtain the services of Jamie Bahnisch and Geoff Mills. Unfortunately, this meant that we could no longer use the services of Kiwi goalkeeper Dean Armstrong due to the overseas player rules. Dean had done a sterling job for us, but we felt the introduction of outfield players to add quality and more playing depth was the key to our survival.

Both the Australians brought with them not just playing quality but also a fresh set of ideas which livened up the squad. This had an immediate impact with four points in our first three games after the Christmas break (more of this break, I will come onto later) and that included our first victory, by the small matter of 10 goals to one!!

Unfortunately, we then lost this momentum we had built up and went on a six game losing streak, although we could easily have got four points from those games, as again we imploded on too many occasions. This left us with a nail-biter finish in a must win game against Ipswich. A 6-3 victory was well deserved and guaranteed National League hockey for another season.

Part of the side's problem this season, was the unprecedented number of injuries we had to contend with. Only four players managed to play every game, and all but one of those had to be nursed through games. Josh Mepham would almost certainly have been close to being our player of the season, if only he had played more than the nine or so he actually managed – the fact that he ended up top-scorer says a lot of our chances of success if he can complete the whole of next season.

We were also able to welcome back after Christmas, Adam Hunter, Adi Palmer, Will Hales, Richard Nourse and Ross Henderson after long term injuries or travelling commitments, which made a huge difference to the strength and depth of squad. Carl Wright also came into the side in goal, and produced a number of impressive performances. When you combine this with the vast amount of work Carl does off the pitch for the club, he is now a vital cog in the

wheel of Chelmsford Hockey Club.

One of the major plus points we ended up with after Christmas, was a highly slick short corner routine, including our “banker” which worked four times out of five (the other being saved on the line). Having gone a couple of seasons scoring a single digit number of corners, we ended up with this being a major strength – our big problem was that we did not win enough corners (I think we won two in four games at one point).

The season also saw a couple of big landmarks, with Adam Hunter reaching the feat of 100 National League appearances, and becoming the seventh player so to do and David Hunter becoming the first male Chelmsford hockey player to the landmark of 200 appearances. When you consider that is at least twelve years of National League hockey, it is a very impressive achievement (although Bolly makes it seem incredibly insignificant!!!). Hunts was also deservedly awarded the Player of the Season award.

So, onwards and upwards for the team. Clubs do go through cycles, and hopefully, much like the British economy, history will show 2009 to be the bottom of the trough for the club and we can start to pick ourselves upwards. We obviously need to go away and work out the best way to strengthen the side, both for the short term and more importantly, the long term. The talent is certainly there in the squad and the players we have should not really be scrapping for their National League status. We have a good mix of young, raw ability and old farts at the back – maybe it is just that little X-Factor that perhaps we are missing.

The season though was not all negative. The Indoor season was almost an unparalleled success for the men. Firstly, the side won the East Indoor, which I think is a first for the men. When you consider we beat fashionable indoor sides like St Albans (who were promoted back to the National League Premier Division) it shows where we stand as an indoor team.

This was followed up with success in the inaugural National Indoor Trophy, beating Leek on penalty strokes in the final. Two trophies in one season must surely be counted as a roaring success and can hopefully lead to greater things for the squad, both indoors and out.

Finally, as I mentioned before, Pete Mepham and Sandra Seleska stepped into the coach and manager roles part of the way through the season. Both have done absolutely fantastic jobs and made my life so much easier! Sandra

stepped in following Woody's decision to step down due to the ongoing problems with his ankle. As I am sure everyone is aware Woody has spent many years being involved with the first team and has always done a great job. It is good to see that Woody has managed to make it to the majority of our home games and his foot is improving – I know that all the guys really enjoy having a beer with him after the game.

Men's 4th XI - Div 4SE - Adrian Ericsson

Played 22, Won 9, Lost 13, Goals For 44, Goals Against 90, Points 27. Finished 7th.

After achieving promotion as Champions from Division 5 last year the team entered the season with some trepidation.

With nine wins and a respectable 7th place finish it might appear to have been a comfortable season. On the other hand it was a season that could easily have seen 22 defeats.

In a tight opening game of the season, playing with 10, we were edged out by Old Southendian. This did not prove to be an omen, from that match on there was a habit of winning close matches and getting hammered in others. The top teams in the league proved far too strong, the top three scoring nearly 50 goals in the six matches.

Only the bottom team in the league conceded more goals than us. At least we avoided conceding double figures in any game, even if Adrian Ericsson had to sacrifice his patella tendon at London Met University, bringing an end to what was shaping into a massacre.

In spite of the defensive record, the defenders were pretty decent this season. Adrian had a fine game against Upminster 3rds, as we won a dreadful game 3-2. Richard Ross and Matt Calderwood were a solid pairing. Tim Fox and Stefan Clough were marauding presences at full back and occasionally in other positions. James Shorey made good progress, being particularly important in a 2-1 win at Colchester.

Will Stanhope and Tim Clarke produced some good play and were always ready to spring attacks from midfield, partly because they rarely tracked back. This left Alistair Fergus firefighting at the base of the midfield, at the defensive end he found ruining attacks a much more difficult task. David Kitchiner was a reassuring presence, providing much needed experience and bite.

Elliott Ball worked tirelessly up front and generally played very well. He proved an elusive presence for both opposition defenders and those collecting the match fees. Adrian Tuff had some important cameos and Simon Bird made big improvements in the first few weeks of the season.

Roy Gemmill's skills were missed in the second half of the season. His constant criticism of the umpire was not, Jon Lambert proving an adequate substitute in that regard.

Some good hockey was played along the way although not usually by us. Gritty would best describe wins over Colchester, Maldon & Little Baddow, Upminster 3rds and East London.

The last few weeks of the season were a bit of an anticlimax because the side was broken up to try and help other sides cover unavailability.

Losing the last four games was a disappointing and undeserved end to the year.

Highlight of the season was a fortunate win over Witham. Holding on at 1-1 with ten minutes left an umpire finally got fed up with Roy and sent him off. As if that wasn't highlight enough, Elliott scored to make it 2-1. In the final moments of the game, Adrian Tuff finally succeeded with a lob over the keeper. The key turned out to be using what might euphemistically be called the outer edge of the D.

Not sure how, but Adrian Ericsson received the most votes for player of the season (Probably the sympathy vote). At least he will not be conceding as many next year with his enforced lay off.

Thanks must go to Chris Denman whose umpiring makes life much easier for the captain.

Finding a goalkeeper each week was always a challenge and it was really pleasing to see so many keepers from other teams willing to help us out - Crawford McKee, Carl Wright, Tim Briggs, Adrian Ericson and Fred Matthews. It's a rare moment when the 6th XI is the talk of the club, but it certainly was when we lost 19-1 to Rhamgaria before Christmas - I'm not sure Fred has recovered from the experience!! It was, therefore, all the more satisfying to keep them to 6-1 in the return fixture and just showed how much we had improved as a team.

I would like to thank Bunny King for the excellent work she did in providing umpires' each week and also to our marvellous caterers for providing the best food in the league.

Chelmsford Ladies 1's - "Poodle" - Lisa Baillie

Following last season's win in the relegation play-offs, the Ladies 1st team knew it would be difficult for them to remain in the top flight of English hockey. Especially when it should be remembered that during the summer break there was a new coach appointed and 6 players from the previous season had either retired or left for new challenges.

Throughout the season, the team suffered some heavy defeats. It would have been easier for Alan Lindsay to have picked the team full of defenders in a bid to stop these score-lines. Instead, his continued enthusiasm was an example to all with his belief in that hockey should be played in an attacking manner.

Chelmsford won several admirers this season in the way they conducted themselves on the pitch and their 'never-say-die' attitude. This is largely due to the continued enthusiasm of Lindsay and captain Marie Arber.

It took till the last game before the break for the indoor season before the Ladies won their first point of the season – this was against old rivals Ipswich.

The indoor season was a welcome break and, with the inclusion of Chloe Rogers and Beccy McGuiness, the indoor squad narrowly missed out on 4th spot for the finals, which were held at the NIA, Birmingham.

As the second half of the outdoor season resumed the team began to score goals. The inexperienced squad was still much in evidence though and some soft goals were conceded. These began to count dearly as the gap between the other teams in the league increased.

Amazingly, the team still had a chance of climbing out of the automatic relegation position right until their penultimate league fixture. As it was, having lost to Clifton in their away fixture, whilst driving back along the M4, the team learnt that Ipswich had their match and so it was that Chelmsford were relegated.

With the last Slazenger Premier Division at home against Ipswich, Chelmsford showed all the fighting spirit which had been in much evidence throughout the season, and finished their season with a well-earned draw.

When reviewing season 2008/09, the Ladies first team were just not good enough to remain in the Premier Division. One reason is definitely the loss of so many players these past few years. It is now time to move on and the future does look positive with the current squad still consisting of a nucleus of experienced players who won silver in the Club European Cup and a draft of younger players who promise great things.

Next season, under the guidance of Alan Lindsay, it will be hoped that the team can get back into the habit of winning and it will not be long before Chelmsford Ladies return to top flight hockey.

There were also opportunities for some much-improved younger players to step up into the team with both Claudia Sidoli and Poppy Church moving up from the 3rd XI while Georgia Herron, named most Promising Junior for the Ladies section, jumping two teams from the 4th XI.

Despite the significant change to personnel, the team enjoyed a dream start to the season beating newly promoted West Herts followed by a win over Holcombe, who were hoping to emulate their success of the season prior. It wasn't until the end of October that the team suffered their first defeat of the season at the hands of eventual league winners, Cambridge City. This dip in form continued until the Christmas break and was compounded by the sidelining of both Lisa Crane and Anna Smith through injury. At points during this five week period, the team did show some great form but were unable to gain the consistency needed to grind out some much needed results, dropping points against Lowestoft, Canterbury and Sudbury.

The New Year break did little alleviate any player woes, with Lisa Crane again out for the media term as a result of a snowboarding injury and a further two players unavailable for the remainder of the season. On several occasions, the player shortage led to the team only being able to field the bare minimum of 11 players and in some cases injured players having to take to the pitch! On a positive note it was during this period that the youngster Church and Herron showed their potential as permanent 2nd XI players, while Katie Roberts showed some excellent form to become a major threat in the midfield line up.

The weather undoubtedly played its part in the season, allowing the team to re-group and take advantage of a back to strength squad for the rearranged games. Having changed the team's formation to strengthen the midfield and allow the pace of the forward line freedom to roam, we entered the rearranged fixtures against league leaders Cambridge City and Dereham with renewed confidence. Encouraging performances in both matches, lead by a strong defence marshalled by Anna Smith and Sarah Williams who both performed solidly throughout the season, saw the team erase the two heavy defeats pre-Christmas, narrowly losing out on closely contested battles on both occasions.

With the season nearing an end, the team failed to pick up three points against bottom of the league Bury St Edmunds and relegation-threatened Sudbury. These were both disappointing results given the strong team performances during which joint top goal scorers of the season, Ally Farrar (player of the season) and Karen Cooper, featured on the score sheet.

This resulted in the greens needing a win in their penultimate game at home against Thurrock to be certain of avoiding relegation. It was this game where the team managed to pull out the sort of performance that they had threatened all season. In an emphatic 5-1 victory (in a game full of drama), the Ladies 2nd XI capped off a solid season and showed excellent form that we will be hoping to carry through to next year.

The team again will undergo some player changes moving into 2009/2010, losing Sarah Williams, Claudia Sidoli and Sophie Stock who all head off to university. We wish them all well.

CHC Coaching and Development

It is an obvious thing that good coaching is the only sustainable route to a strong club. Unlike football teams, and indeed some other hockey clubs, we are not able to buy players and although this year we have been able to use funds to bring in some temporary support players we need to consider our coaching and development policy.

This season we have had Alan Lindsay coaching the Ladies 1sts and whilst we have not been able to stay in the premiership this was due mainly to the departure of senior players, mostly known about in advance, but too severe to be able to ride out. When a team loses the services of four current internationals and the likes of Lyn Bollington and Tracey Willmore - leaving a team of promising youngsters - Alan's job was always going to be uphill. The youngsters came on well as individuals and as a team through the season but the strength and experience wasn't there to survive in the top flight. The expectation is that this group of players can be kept together and then the work this season will be rewarded next – particularly if we can add one or two older heads in the off-season.

Kath McDonald – a former 1st XI player who has been away from the Club coaching elsewhere and has had a baby – has been coaching the 2nd XI. They have again held their own in the East Premier League, although Kath has been disappointed that player availability has been patchy – resulting in a lack of competition for places at times and bringing players up and down from the 3rd XI inevitably disrupts team patterns of play. The 2nd XI and 3rd XI have both had a good share of under 18s – illustrating the success and strength of the club in youth development.

Simon Price has coached the Ladies 3rd XI and provides a helpful link with the youth section where he coaches the Girls Under 15 team. The 3rd XI were promoted into Division 2 SW at the end of last season and while they found it tough won 5 and drew 6 of their 22 games to retain the status for next year.

The Men's 1sts suffered when Duncan Wood decided not to stay on after pre-season preparation and, after a period without a coach, Peter Mepham stepped in to make a real difference to fitness, organisation on the pitch and morale. The 1st XI clinched the retention of their place in the East Conference with the last match of the season, beating Ipswich and condemning them to relegation. The team played very well at times and if they had had a natural goalscoring centre forward they would have ended up in the top half of the

table. They were strengthened in the second half of the season by two under 21 Aussies who came across to experience life in the UK for 3 months. Our thanks go to them and to Peter Mepham.

The Mens 2nd XI this year joined the London League – partly for the consistency of level of competition and partly because the travelling is much easier than to Wisbech and Lincolnshire. They had a thoroughly enjoyable time in the 1st Division – and probably enjoyed more games than they won! Nevertheless with Gavin Spencer's coaching they secured a second season in the 1st Division of the London League and should really have achieved more wins for the quality of their play at times.

Liam Dowling, who is County Under 16 boys coach, took on the job of coaching the 3rd XI to try to maximise on the Mens side the preparation of our under 16s and under 18s for 2nd and 1st XI hockey. He worked hard to try to install discipline and professionalism in the team but many of the older players struggled to make training and were not keen on a meet 2 hours before the game started for a tactics talk with a whiteboard before warm-up!

This illustrates an important point that the coaching strategy needs to be joined up across the club so that all teams at the higher end are playing to consistent approaches and the youth section are preparing players for styles of hockey and a standard of basic skills that will enable them to play at a high level. This includes decisions on how much we are going to reflect in the club's teams the single system of England Hockey with an emphasis *inter alia* on 5:3:2 (which our older readers will be more familiar with than those under 40!) We do not at the moment have a Club Head Coach but need to think about this as a position. In the meantime the coaches meet every 4 to 6 weeks to share plans and experience and to do our best to ensure we are joined up in what we do.

This article focuses on outdoor and adult hockey. Future articles can look at the indoor game and the youth section.

Some old friends and VPs of the club have passed on in the last year or so and we have tried below to give a short background on some (what someone described to me as "Oh I see, you mean a short Biopsy on each one", but we think that is a bit too intimate and we are going to stick to a short biography).

Ken Lochead.

Ken was associated with the club for over 30 years and was a widely respected umpire with a wry sense of humour. I was pleased to have been sat next to him at the men's dinner two years ago when he regaled me with many stories of his time as an umpire and a few repeatable ones as a tax inspector. He passed away in June 2008.

Ron Puddephat.

Ron died late last year and about a dozen old stagers from the club attended the funeral in Little Baddow. We sat mostly in a respectful group at the back of the church so that if any of us also passed on during the service, the others could prop him up and there would not be a fuss. Ron was over 90 when he died and played well into his 30's which was VERY old for those days. He was a headmaster in London, was tall and slim and played a very upright style with one of those old English hockey sticks, carved from oak. He used to cycle back to Little Baddow after games from the old club house at what is now the county cricket ground at first on a very old upright bicycle with the handlebars known as "North Road Raised" and then later on a moped, usually very wobbly from a deal of Gray's bitter and he must have fallen into the ditch on many occasions, presumably in severe cold. At least there was not much traffic then, maybe the odd hay wagon or a steam omnibus. There is now some discussion amongst the VPs and Friend's of Chelmsford Hockey Club Re-united as to who is the oldest surviving male ex-playing member – probably Alan Gemmill – (to be decided!)


