

The youth section continues to go from strength to strength with over 200 fully paid members so far this season, significantly out-numbering the senior membership. Our U14 – U18 members train at various times during the week, and play in all of the Senior teams - even knocking on the door of the 1stXIs. Both pitches are a hive of activity every Sunday morning from 9am – 11.30am. – why not pop down and take a look at our stars in the making! If there isn't anyone there – they'll all be off at a White Knights Tournament, playing a Friendly League game or maybe an Indoor fixture.....

A number of managers,



coaches and committee members are standing down at the end of the season so volunteers to help with one of the teams or on the committee would be much appreciated. Please form an orderly queue at the bacon roll counter on Sunday mornings or talk to any manager, coach or committee member. They will all be very pleased to have your assistance. With squads of up to 40 in the younger (up to U13) age groups there is always room for more volunteers. There is a coaches and managers meeting in the clubhouse on 11 March so why not come along and see how you can help.

So what do you get out of it? Apart from the obvious satisfaction of being actively involved in helping young players grow and develop their skills to international standard (see below) there are regular opportunities to get soaked or freeze during the cold Winter mornings (or evenings for senior groups) and then to meet in the clubhouse to thaw out over a few cups of coffee and bacon rolls or, when the ladies' or men's 1<sup>st</sup> XI's are playing at home, a few drinks at the bar. ## Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor



I cannot work out whether England Hockey is stupid, incompetent or downright arrogant. Whichever it is, they are self-evidently not working in the interests of the national game. What else can one conclude when the Ladies GB squad (a.k.a. England, complete with coach) is sent off to South Africa on the first weekend of the National Indoor League? While the simpletons might say "it was just one weekend", it amounted to the whole season once player recuperation was enforced and, of course, was critical for qualification to the Indoor Championships. Take nothing away from Slough, Bowdon Hightown and the other qualifiers, but even they must feel that the competition must have been tarnished by the absence of the country's top players. Sour grapes might be the cry, but when last year's finalists fail to make the cut, the most hardened cynic will have to admit something is not quite right.

Somewhat ironic also there has been much fanfare about this year being the one to field a national indoor side once more.

Yet there is some consistency in this cavalier attitude by EH to our top domestic competitions. Both the outdoor league and cup competitions have been affected in recent seasons (as many of the top clubs will agree) and the success of last year's Indoor Championships ensured that few noticed a situation that was simultaneously farcical and outrageous. This was the decision (without research or consultation) to insist that all participants wore the new EH sponsor's kit, riding roughshod over the (legal) agreements that many top clubs had made long before with their own kit sponsors. One could guess what will happen when it comes to renewing those arrangements – the result being that hard-to-find money is "transferred" from the

clubs' pockets to the national organisation, with no overall increase in benefit to the national game. The farce occurred when the official supplier provided kit the night before the start of the tournament with wrong sizes, wrong colours, incorrectly-spelt club names, and over-printing – this, despite having several weeks and all the relevant information to get it right. It was a shameful and shameless situation – if this is professional management, give me amateur every time.

Everyone is aware that success at international level is a key factor in funding, but a strong and consistently supported series of national competitions is the (only) foundation stone of long-term success. Bleeding the senior clubs dry of finance and their top talent at critical times is clearly not the way to go about it. The huge army of volunteer coaches, officials and helpers that EH is looking to tap in to at the moment will rightly be having second thoughts when they see that England Hockey's strategic philosophy is to ask with one hand and take away with the other.
