First of all, I am delighted to tell you that Edmund Carr, the leading local firm of Chartered Accountants based in London Road, has agreed a generous five year sponsorship deal with the Club. A formal announcement and an accompanying media event will occur later in the summer, along with the presentation of their cheque. Their name and contact information will appear on advertising boards on the Waterbase pitch, as well as in the match programmes and other locations. in short, Edmund Carr will become part of the very fabric of the Club.

It is hoped that members, whether individuals or those running businesses, will look seriously at the excellent services offered by Edmund Carr, an established and highly-respected firm, and reciprocate in kind for the very generous support that they are showing to us by using those services over the coming years.

Elsewhere, we continue to market the Club for sponsorship purposes and hope to have further good news for you from other potential sponsors. Having taken a 'stepped' approach to marketing Chelmsford Hockey Club, first by direct-mailing all club members, then by using targeted and general mailings to companies in the Chelmsford area, we are now entering the third stage, by approaching national organisations with a revamped version of the full brochure and sponsorship tariff.

In addition, next season, the Club is looking to introduce an idea borrowed from other senior EHL clubs, that of the 1st team squad members arranging for an individual sponsor themselves, with the proceeds going into club funds. The sponsor's name will appear alongside the player's pen portrait in match programmes, as well as enjoying other benefits yet to be decided. By spreading the responsibility amongst 40 or so people, but keeping the individual targets relatively modest, we feel there is a better chance of achieving our overall target for sponsorship. Even so, this initiative will only contribute

25% or so of what we are aiming to raise on an annual basis in the long term for the whole club.

Marketing and Publicity

I hope you will agree that the 2004/2005 season was the best ever for the Club, not only on the pitch, but also off the pitch, in terms of the media exposure that it enjoyed. From TV reports and radio interviews to regular features in the local newspapers to articles in the hockey media, the tireless work engineered by Helen McDonnell, with the usual superb contribution of match reports from Lynn Bollington and David Kitchiner, has reaped many dividends for the Club.

Contrary to what some people might think, public relations is a core component of a successful club like Chelmsford (and this season has proved how well it works). Of course, you need the results on the field and you need a solid groundswell of support from

the members. Without that, very little is possible. However, that is the beginning of a 'beneficial circle' where success attracts media interest (and that has to be fought for, in contest with other clubs and other sports), which, in turn, attracts sponsorship interest. The final turn of the circle then sees financial benefits flowing back to the Club and its members to maintain or even improve the top class facilities it enjoys and to help engender even more success on the pitch (through, say, the availability of coaches throughout the Club, not just for the 1st and 2nd teams).

We have already seen the signs of this working, and working very well indeed. There are already benefits there which are tangible to very many members, and using the momentum already in place, we, collectively, can maintain and increase them. To this end, we are proposing to organise a 'media events' diary. This will not only include things like the expected EHL fixture list, but we also want to incorporate other newsworthy events, like players representing their regions or their countries, or umpires and coaches gaining higher recognition, or teams performing well within their own league.

For all this, we need to have information well in advance of all likely events where a Chelmsford team or a Chelmsford member is or may be involved. This means from junior levels to top internationals - everything that involves success of one sort or another is potentially a media story that can benefit the Club as a whole, as well as reflecting the individual's or team's success. While we expect to continue 'reactive' reporting (match scores

and results), the anticipation of events to come, the build-up, the occurrence and the aftermath ensures that the name of Chelmsford Hockey Club remains consistently in the forefront of local and regional sports news. As already mentioned, this has significant sponsorship benefits, but also it helps the recruitment of new players (at all ability levels and ages) as well as underpinning our ability to run regional, national and international tournaments, with all the kudos and revenue that accrues from that as well.

Accordingly, in the not too distant future, every sector of the Club and many members will receive a request to supply key calendar dates which are relevant to them in the coming season. By doing so, a whole series of articles and publicity events can then be planned, offering a variety of items which will be of interest to either local, regional and/or national press. It entails a lot of hard work (and will stand or fall on the level of support received from within the Club), but the all-round benefits will make it very much worthwhile. While the Ladies 1st team enjoyed much of the limelight last season (for quite understandable and deserved reasons), it is hoped that we can increase the glow of publicity around other parts of the Club, so that as many as possible have an opportunity to be seen and noted as being a significant contributor to the success of Chelmsford Hockey Club. Please, where you can, give this your whole-hearted support.

Youth Report

Many will be unaware of the large (100+) and active youth section that plays hockey under the banner of Chelmsford Hockey Club.

On Sunday mornings children from the age of 5 to 13 (year 1-year 8) train under the watchful eyes of volunteer coaches and are taught the game of hockey. Playing the mini version – 7 aside on half a pitch – they train and play in the White Knights league. This a league covering Essex which allows mixed U9, under 11 boys and girls and under 13 boys and girls to regularly play other clubs and the results are compiled over the season. Chelmsford came 3rd overall and we able to follow the ethos of the league by trying to ensure that all members were given the opportunity of playing whatever their experience.

The teams entered a number of tournaments. Our under 11 and under 13 girls both came runners up in the Essex Minis Competition, the under 13 girls came runners up and the under 11 girls won the Old Loughts May day tournament and the club came second across all the age groups at the White League Festival. The under 13 girls tried indoor hockey and won the Stortford College competition.

At the age of 9 children can trial for the Essex teams, first joining the Development squads and then the actual teams. Many of our players have been successful in this and some of the girls have already attended East

development camps-the next level up.

The most important aspect of this work is that the children enjoy their sport, feel as though they are getting better and they have an opportunity to make friendships that will endure for many years. The work can only happen because there a number of mad adults that are prepared to turn up week after week early on a Sunday morning and I would like to thank Rosie, Hil, Ed, Keith, Bob, Simon, Trudi, Chris, Roger, Kit, Nigel, Mervyn, Karen, Andy, Simon and a host of co-opted parents in help with the little ones.



The other part of life for the mini is the clubhouse where we serve the famous bacon roll.

We have a number of stalwarts that turn up weekly, to prepare the refreshments which is a significant source of income to the club and my thanks go to Hilary, Mary and Sue for this – we now need some more helpers as Mary and Sue have hung up their aprons!

Having reached the grand age of 13 going on 14, the youngsters move on to the 11 aside game and train midweek. The boys take part in the Mercian League-U14, U16 and U18 as well as the Hockey Association Cup. With the local senior schools not really active in playing hockey, with the pull of football and rugby, we struggle to put out full sides of the right age group. Notwithstanding that, the U16 boys qualified for the

Mercian League playoffs – effectively a national quarter final and the under 18 boys put on an amazing display in the cup when they comprehensively took Ipswich apart – it was a joy to watch! The level of skill and speed that these boys can play at is great to watch - please take the chance to come and watch next season.

Again these matches and training only take place because of volunteers and we are so grateful to Royce, Liz and David for all their help. Also to Natalie Fulton in her role as Director of Coaching who had such an impact. We are looking particularly for someone who can coach the U18's at matches and maybe put the odd training session together – can you help?

The girls do not yet have the advantage of leagues and the only real competitions are the U15 and U18 Hockey cup and U16 and U18 indoor hockey. However the U15's had a good run and played a couple of friendly matches. The under 18's ended their season late having qualified for the National Hockey Cup plate finals and came so close – losing on flicks. In the indoors both teams teams got through to East representing Essex and the U18's went on the National Finals. The results were perhaps a little disappointing but an amazing achievement nevertheless. Thanks go to Sally, Hil, Chris and Alan for all their efforts.

A number of these older young players have represented Essex, some playing in National finals and winning! Some have gone onto to play for East and two went to England Trials – Julia Butterworth was selected.

We have continued to follow international friendships with a visit by the U14's to U18's to Zevernbergen, Holland. The trip organised by Philippa, Thelma. Sue and a host of others was a tremendous success and everyone enjoyed themselves and came home safely. The under 13 girls hosted a team from Arnheim, Holland and are now looking forward to a return visit later this year.

The youth section is initially overseen by a committee. Sue Dewar has for a number of years sorted out all aspects of membership with an amazing efficiency. She now feels she has done her time and I look like to record formally our thanks for all she has done. Andy Roberts must be one of the best event organisers I know-we now have an enviable reputation in the county. Liz Nourse deals with all the paperwork and Bob, Elizabeth, Hilary and Carol keep getting involved and roped in for everything and anything! Thanks also go to the main club for all their support.

Looking forward is exciting. Mervyn is setting up an indoor competition for under 9's which he is hoping to develop into something much bigger. There is talk of a league for U15 girls and whatever happens we plan to arrange at least one match a month for them. We have great hopes for all the teams both locally and nationally and are committed to continue to encourage their development as players and as team members. We are looking to particularly encourage boys to join and if you would like to be involved in any way – please do say.

Breaking News - Chelmsford duo win Gold in Korea

Many congratulations to 1st XI Captain Lisa Wooding and Chloe Rogers who won their first Gold Medals in a major tournament playing for the England Women's Team in the prestigious KT Cup in Korea today.

In a thrilling "Final" to this week long tournament England faced host nation Korea a side ranked above them in the Sahara World Hockey Team Standings. But England matched the Koreans both tactically and technically and despite going a goal down maintained their discipline and Chloe Rogers persistence was rewarded as she robbed a Korean

defender of the ball to set up the equaliser. A second goal followed just four minutes later and a pin point drag flick moments later sealed victory for this young group of England players.



Commenting after the match, England Coach Danny Kerry said: "Today we won through some basic human qualities – desire, passion and playing for each other. It was fantastic to be part of this".

Despite Lisa and Chloe's combined tally of 23 caps neither player had ever competed in a major tournament for the England Womens' Senior squad so the 14 hour flight to the Korean capital of Seoul crossing eight different time zones was well worth while.

The 18 strong squad who also remained undefeated against China ranked fourth in the world, India, Malaysia and Ireland had the added inspiration of playing in the Songnam Stadium where the Great Britain men's side won their coveted Olympic Gold Medal in 1988.

This was Lisa's second trip back to Seoul having represented England back in 1997 in the World Cup where they finished eighth and she said after the match:

"This was an incredible team performance. We weren't sure what to expect from the Asian Teams because they are so strong but we matched them in terms of the physical tempo, stamina, technical ability and most importantly our discipline never wavered. This is a huge confidence booster for the squad

with two key tournaments coming up in July and August".

Both players will be hoping that their performance will have impressed the coach sufficiently to ensure selection for the Champions Challenge in the U.S.A. next month and the Women's European Championships in Dublin in August.


Gareth Carr (Gugs): Almost weekly brought out a suitcase. Not for travelling, but to drink.....getting all and sundry in the club to drink
